1. **People who don't work**

When you are on the clock at LVA you are working. If you're not working, you should be studying. If you're not doing anything, go home. If you don't do anything—ever—leave and return to your home school. You can just as easily do nothing there, and the expectation isn't nearly as high.
2. **Not being accountable for your time**

11. **Walking away from the rail without reweighting what you've done**

15. **Not thoroughly cleaning out paintbrushes, buckets, pans, rollers and roller frames, etc., or not cleaning up your paint mess**

16. **Sticking things to walls, TAGGING or writing your name or anyone else's name, or anything else, on walls, pieces of scenery, etc., or especially in the dark, hidden places in the theaters.**

That is considered malicious vandalism, and will be punished and prosecuted as such. It's not YOURS, so don't write on it.
17. **Walking away from a specifically assigned task**

I will call the Dean and have you picked up for truancy.
18. **Disrespecting faculty and staff members**

ANY staff or faculty member with whom you come in contact is there to look out for your well-being and the ongoing educational process. If they speak to you, you respond with utmost respect and do what they tell you to do.
19. **Disrespecting your crew head**

Your crew head determines your jobs, hours and success. He/she evaluates your performance

20. Disrespecting your crew

26. Not striking after a show/not closing down properly for the evening

This especially applies to those one or two day shows such as band, choir, etc. Each department is responsible for their own equipment, but if you have been assigned sound, you strike all the mics and sound cable, if you were projectionist, you need to strike and store all that equipment, etc. The goods get taken out to head height, and the stage gets swept before you leave.

27. Using it and then not following through with it

If you turned it on, took it out, opened it up, uncovered it or plugged it in, you need to be the one that turns it off, puts it back, closes it up, covers it or unplugs it.

28. Dumping the mop water right outside the door

This relates to number 8. Dump it ONLY in a mop sink.

29. Propping doors open
